At the same time, we also need to continue providing aid packs to disadvantaged families (£30 buys flour, beans maize, cooking and soap for a whole family).

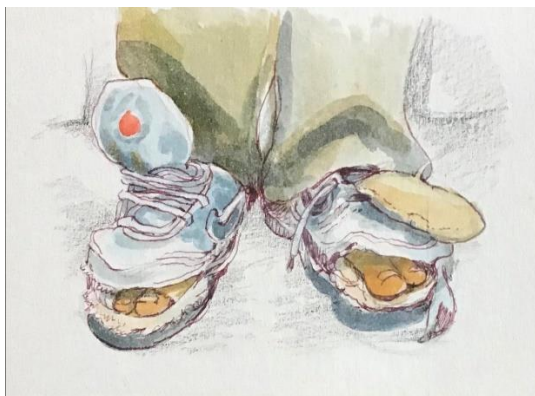
